



Seymore Papert studied with Piaget and created LOGO. He coined the term "constructionism."

















A crash course Maria Montessori, MD

- Born: August 31, 1870 in Italy; died in 1952, age 82 in Netherlands.
- The first female in Italy to be an MD.
- An only child; said to be "strong willed."
- Never married; had one son -- Mario Montessori
- She did research on "idiot" or "defective" children in the slums of Rome that shaped her work.
- Invited to USA by Bell & Edison, spoke at Carnegie Hall in 1915. Forced into exile to India in WWII.



"The greatest sign of success for a teacher... is to be able to say, 'The children are now working as if I did not exist'."



What might Maria Montessori say?



- Technology can be part of the problem. But it can also be part of the solution.
- An app is merely another material.
- She'd like Chip's "it's not about screen time. It's about time."
- Keep an open mind, use scientific method.
- Keep things in balance. Screens are highly symbolic, and removed from reality. But this is also a strength.
- You can buy a lot of attribute blocks for the price of one iPad.
- No technology can replace the touch of a sparrow's feather

What might BF Skinner say?

- Apps like Angry Birds and Candy Crush are case studies in applied behaviorism.
- It's fascinating to see how conditioned we all have become to technology based cues.
- Methods of operant conditioning have migrated successfully, for better or worse, from the casino into children's apps.
- Today's smart phone is the ultimate teaching machine.




What might Fred Rogers say?



- The distance between any media product and a child is a sacred space.
- Quality isn't cheap, and it requires hard work like playing the piano.
- Focus on just one little buckeroo.
- Slow it down, get it right
- Learn "Fred-ish"
- Be your honest self. Show children how it works. Don't sugar it up or water it down.
- It's OK to turn it off.

1. Create a sense of worth?


2. Create a sense of trust?

You can prevent child drownings by building walls around pools.

But you can get the same result by teaching a child to swim.

One approach puts your limited energy into restrictions; the other into child empowerment.

It can help to boil down your screen time strategy to three words – access, balance, and support, or A.B.S.











- 1. Born in Italy in 1934, still alive.
- 2. Best known for flow (or autotellic) state.
- 3. Interested in "Positive Psychology"
- 4. People are happiest when they are in a state of flow—a state of concentration or complete absorption.
- 5. Many forms of IM foster flow.



ABS = Access, Balance, Support

A is for Access to all forms of quality media. There's only one way to learn how technology works – to get your hands on it. That means playing, fiddling and sometimes testing the limits of smart speakers, laptops, flying drones, touch screen tablets. Actively seek quality apps – here are a few (CTREX).

B is for Balance. Just as a healthy diet consists of a variety of foods, a child needs a mix of concrete and abstract, real and pretend. Camping, tending a garden, taking care of a puppy or practicing the clarinet can help offset abstract screen time.

Technology is part of the problem.

But it is also part of the solution.

S is for Support. Left on their own with YouTube, most children will gorge themselves. They need oldfashioned supervision and role models to set limits and demonstrate how to use technology to enhance and empower (rather than distract and waste time).





A new golden rule for children's media creators.

"Do unto other people's children as you would do unto your own."
